
Among current pretrial jail inmates assigned to Judge Harmon:

- 87% of Black defendants (172 out of 198)
- 62% of Hispanic White defendants (57 out of 92)
- 83% of non-Hispanic White defendants (84 out of 101)

were detained per night based on inability to pay

Last week, among current pretrial jail inmates assigned to Judge Harmon, 87% of Black defendants (172 out of 198 on an average night), 62% of Hispanic White defendants (57 out of 92 on an average night), and 83% of non-Hispanic White defendants (84 out of 101 on an average night) were detained in Harris County Jail because they couldn't afford money bail.

Judge Harmon's racial difference in the share detained due to inability to pay for Black and Non-Hispanic White defendants is among the 25% best in Harris County. Her racial difference in the share detained due to inability to pay for Hispanic and Non-Hispanic White defendants is among the 25% worst in Harris County.
