
Among current pretrial jail inmates assigned to Judge Harmon:

- 75% of Black defendants (134 out of 179)
- 68% of Hispanic White defendants (42 out of 62)
- 58% of non-Hispanic White defendants (72 out of 124)

were detained per night based on inability to pay

Last week, among current pretrial jail inmates assigned to Judge Harmon, 75% of Black defendants (134 out of 179 on an average night), 68% of Hispanic White defendants (42 out of 62 on an average night), and 58% of non-Hispanic White defendants (72 out of 124 on an average night) were detained in Harris County Jail because they couldn't afford money bail.

Judge Harmon's racial difference in the share detained due to inability to pay for Black and Non-Hispanic White defendants is among the 50% best in Harris County. Her racial difference in the share detained due to inability to pay for Hispanic and Non-Hispanic White defendants is among the 50% worst in Harris County.



Track Judge Harmon's Share Detained Due to Inability to Pay

This report uses jail population data provided by Harris County. Share detained due to inability to pay represents the percent of current pretrial jail inmates assigned to this judge who were detained because they couldn't afford money bail.
